

Clarifying Policy Options: Preventive War

To manage society, we need an effective set of policies. Deliberation is used to determine the best policies.

The deliberation process is about effective dialog. Different from debate where the motivation is to defend one's stance, the deliberation dynamic is one of **synergy**. The objective is to better understand opposing views in the search for common ground. Policies cannot be steamrollers that flatten the opposition.

Democracy is based on majority rule, but with respect for views that may be in the minority. Finding common ground presents a way forward that respects the merit of opposing views—taking the wisdom of both perspectives to create a more balanced policy that will ultimately be a more effective policy.
